*Purpose and Summary*

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The Health Care Professional Recruitment Program (Iowa Code section 256.223) was repealed on July 1, 2025, by 2025 Iowa Acts, House File 972, so there is no further benefit of Chapter 14.

### *Analysis of Impact*

#### **1. Persons affected by the proposed rulemaking:**

- **Classes of persons that will bear the costs of the proposed rulemaking:**

Iowans will not bear any costs related to the rescission of Chapter 14.

- **Classes of persons that will benefit from the proposed rulemaking:**

Iowa residents may benefit from the rescission of Chapter 14 since the rescission will eliminate information on a loan repayment program that no longer exists.

#### **2. Impact of the proposed rulemaking, economic or otherwise, including the nature and amount of all the different kinds of costs that would be incurred:**

- **Quantitative description of impact:**

The rescission of Chapter 14 has no impact on costs.

- **Qualitative description of impact:**

The rescission of Chapter 14 has no impact on costs.

#### **3. Costs to the State:**

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- **Implementation and enforcement costs borne by the agency or any other agency:**

The rescission of Chapter 14 has no impact on costs.

- **Anticipated effect on State revenues:**

The rescission of Chapter 14 is not anticipated to have an impact on State revenues.

#### **4. Comparison of the costs and benefits of the proposed rulemaking to the costs and benefits of inaction:**

The benefit of rescinding Chapter 14 is eliminating obsolete information since Iowans can neither apply for nor receive the loan repayment award.

The cost of inaction would be confusion and unnecessary inquiries about the loan repayment program and the application process, both of which no longer exist.

#### **5. Determination whether less costly methods or less intrusive methods exist for achieving the purpose of the proposed rulemaking:**

Rescinding Chapter 14 is the most efficient approach under Executive Order 10.

#### **6. Alternative methods considered by the agency:**

- **Description of any alternative methods that were seriously considered by the agency:**

No other methods were seriously considered since the method proposed is the most cost-efficient approach and eliminates potential confusion among Iowans seeking out loan repayment funding.

● **Reasons why alternative methods were rejected in favor of the proposed rulemaking:**

The alternative methods were rejected because they would lead to informational burdens on students, families, Iowans in the workforce, and the Commission.
