State or Federal Law Implemented

This rulemaking implements, in whole or in part, 2025 Iowa Acts, House File 644.

Purpose and Summary

This proposed rulemaking updates the State Board of Education's rules concerning the role of foster parents as special education decision-makers. This proposed rulemaking harmonizes provisions of 2025 Iowa Acts, House File 644, with federal law.

ITEM 1. Amend paragraph 41.30(1)"b" as follows:

b. A foster parent, unless state law, regulations, or contractual obligations with a state or local entity prohibit a foster parent from acting as a parent if the foster parent is otherwise qualified under this rule or is appointed to serve as a parent under this chapter by the Iowa department of health and human services;

ITEM 2. Amend paragraph 120.27(1)"b" as follows:

b. A foster parent, unless state law, regulations, or contractual obligations with a state or local entity prohibit a foster parent from acting as a parent if the foster parent is otherwise qualified under this rule or is appointed to serve as a parent under this chapter by the Iowa department of health and human services;
