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
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Iowa Community College Fall Term 2001 Credit Student Enrollment Report

The Iowa community colleges transmit the Fall 2001 enrollments to the Department of Education after the 14th day of the fall term start date. All data in this report, except where noted, are taken from the Management Information System (MIS) electronic data files and are confirmed by the community college transmittal sheet. The Fall 2001 unduplicated credit headcount enrollment of 68,790 demonstrates an increase of 5 percent over Fall 2000 enrollment of 65,473.

Total Enrollment by Program Type: Community college fall credit enrollment continues to grow, with approximately 58 percent pursuing College Parallel program majors. (See Figure 1.) College Parallel program enrollment increased 13 percent from 35,427 in 2000 to 39,920 in 2001. Career Technical enrollment increased 7 percent from 23,064 to 24,396 over the same time period, and Career Option/College Parallel (preparation for a vocation and transfer to a four-year institution), decreased 40 percent from 7,602 to 4,496. Total enrollment includes 68,812 duplicated headcount of 22 students enrolled in more than one program.

Comparative College Enrollments and Full-Time and Part-Time Totals: Fall unduplicated credit enrollment totaled 68,790. These data are summarized in Table 1.



The ratio of full-time to part-time students is 52 percent to 48 percent; however, there are differences across the colleges. The percentage of full-time students ranges from a high of 68 percent at Indian Hills Community College to a low of 43 percent at Des Moines Area Community College.


Residency of Students: Iowa's community colleges are noted for attracting and retaining Iowa residents. As Figure 2 indicates, 94 percent of the fall enrollees are Iowa residents.

Gender of Students: Consistent with national trends in postsecondary education, the majority of community college students are female. (See Figure 3)

Age of Students: The average age for Iowa community college students enrolled on the 14th day of the fall term is 24.1 years. Sixty-three percent (63%) of the total credit enrollment is 22 years or less, with 12 percent less than 18 years of age. The age distribution is described in Table 2, and illustrated in Figure 4.

Age Distribution for Fall 2001 Credit Enrollments




Ethnicity of Students: Community college enrollments represent the ethnicity of the citizens of the state as a whole, surpassing in all minority categories their proportional share of the total state population.

Student Program Majors: Approximately 58 percent of community college students are enrolled in College Parallel programs. The Industrial Technical programs enroll the largest number of Career-Technical Preparatory students followed by Business and Health. These data are illustrated in Figure 5.



Type of Program: Community college students are enrolled in a variety of program types. Over half are enrolled in College Parallel programs. The remainder of the students are predominantly enrolled in Career-Technical Preparatory and Career Option/College Parallel programs. (See Table 4)

Gender Distribution: Career and Technical programs tend to have a larger percentage of male students than College Parallel and Career Option/College Parallel programs, but still less than 50 percent.
