Reviewed List of Nationally Peer-Reviewed Clearinghouses of Evidence-Based Interventions

Introduction

The purpose of this document is to provide nationally published, peer-reviewed clearinghouses of evidencebased programs (EBPs) to schools. It is a source of clearinghouses that met the Iowa Department of Education's (Department) established criteria for EBPs that address unfinished learning (federally referred to as "learning loss") caused by the COVID-19 pandemic and respond to students' social, emotional, mental health, and academic needs, as detailed by the <u>American Rescue Plan Elementary and Secondary School</u> <u>Emergency Relief (ESSER III or ARP ESSER) and Evidence-Based Interventions guidance</u>, the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), and the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).

Criteria

Clearinghouses were reviewed based on the following criteria:

- (a) Addressing at least one of the ESSA or ESSER III domains;
- (b) Indicating targeted domains, age or grade spans, and intended outcomes;
- (c) Being available to all users;
- (d) Being without potential conflict of interest; and
- (e) Having some type of standardized process that includes a quantifiable or categorical measure of effectiveness.

Please note that Table 1 is a list of clearinghouses that met the review criteria, not a list of approved EBPs. Review criteria for EBPs also vary by the clearinghouse, which may result in differences in how a particular program is listed or categorized between clearinghouses.

The Department reviewed ease of use and usability information for each clearinghouse to support schools' decision-making when available. The review included considerations, such as:

- Whether the clearinghouse includes information about the cost, required training, implementor qualifications, or program duration for each EBP.
- The ease of accessing reviews within the clearinghouse (i.e., whether the reviews seemed easy to access and consume or were embedded within lengthy technical reports).
- How recent the information provided within each clearinghouse is.

Clearinghouses Meeting Established Criteria

The results of the Department's review of clearinghouses meeting the Department's established criteria are included in Table 1. The majority of those listed cover the pre-kindergarten to grade 12 (PK-12) grade span.

Domains and Usability

In Table 1, the following domains are reported:

- (L) Literacy,
- (M) Mathematics,
- (W) Writing,
- (Sc) Science,
- (SEBH) Social-Emotional-Behavioral Health,
- (A) Attendance, and
- (SE) Special Education.

Additionally, those indicated with a "+" are considered the most usable, while those designated with a "0" are considered less usable.

Clearinghouses Not Meeting Established Criteria

Table 2 lists clearinghouses that the Department reviewed, but that did not meet the established review criteria. The table also identifies which of the following criteria were *not* met:

- (a) Addressing at least one of the ESSA or ESSER III domains;
- (b) Indicating the targeted domains, age or grade spans, and intended outcomes;
- (c) Being available to all users;
- (d) Being without potential conflict of interest; and
- (e) Having some type of standardized process that includes a quantifiable or categorical measure of effectiveness.

Although the clearinghouses listed below did not meet all the review criteria described above, they may be helpful and valuable for other purposes and local use.
