# **Director's Updates**

# May 17, 2024

Iowa Department of Education Director, Commissioner Snow, will provide department updates.

#### IOWA COLLEGE STUDENT AID COMMISSION Executive Director & Bureau Chief's Report May 17, 2024

With the end of the legislative session, we're pleased that House File 2153 was unanimously passed through both chambers of the legislature and signed into law by Governor Reynolds April 19. The bill changes reporting requirements for many lowa College Aid financial aid programs and consolidates those reports into a single annual report. Its passage will reduce the time and energy staff devote to multiple reports and allow them to focus those efforts and energies on our programs and mission.

In the same spirit of efficiency, we are evaluating the effectiveness and need for our Weekly Report to commissioners in conjunction with other periodic reports and updates throughout the Department of Education. I implore you to share any thoughts with me on the efficacy of this report, and adjustments to either content, frequency or delivery would make it a more appropriate resource for our commissioners and other valued stakeholders.

#### Scholarships & Grants

We are currently in the final stages of issuing our report on the Education Training Voucher program. Using custom data sets from the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), Iowa College Aid Processing System (ICAPS) and National Student Clearinghouse (NSC), the report provides the demographic composition and distribution of each cohort and details how ETV recipients progress through postsecondary education.

Staff recently selected recipients for various scholarship and grant awards, including the Mental Health Professional Loan Repayment Program. The program received 71 applications and made 13 awards. Those 13 awardees are eligible to receive up to \$40,000 in student loan repayment after successfully serving for five years as full-time mental health professionals in an at-need community in Iowa.

The Health Care Award Program issued 20 awards that provide financial awards to nurse educators teaching full-time at eligible lowa colleges and universities, as well as applicants who agree to practice as registered nurses, advanced registered nurse practitioners, or physician assistants in service commitment areas for five consecutive years and who meet the program's requirements. The maximum annual award is \$6,000 annually for up to five consecutive years of full-time employment. A total of 161 lowans applied for the program this year.

The Health Professional Recruitment Program also awarded 27 lowans a total of \$895,033 for serving as an advanced registered nurse practitioner, athletic trainer,

occupational therapist, physical therapist, physician, physician assistant, podiatrist or registered nurse practicing in a high-need community in Iowa. A total of 61 applications were received.

Bureau of Iowa College aid staff recently presented at the Iowa Association of School Financial Aid Administrators (IASFAA) conference on this year's FAFSA cycle and its challenges. Tristan Lynn and Liz Yaddof were joined by the Iowa College Access Network's Erick Danielson in guiding attendees on overcoming FAFSA challenges, completion resources and changes to the Iowa Financial Aid Application (IFAA) for the 2024-25 academic year.

Todd Brown and I also hosted a general session regarding updates on the Bureau of lowa College Aid's organizational structure within the lowa Department of Education, the Bureau's community engagement programs, legislative updates and 2024-25 awarding parameters.

A special congratulations to Tristan Lynn, who is completing his term as IASFAA's treasurer, continuing the Bureau of Iowa College Aid's strong legacy of providing leadership to IASFAA.

#### **Course to College**

This week is lowa Decision Week, during which we help schools and communities celebrate their students' postsecondary decisions. Dozens of schools are participating in statewide celebrations this week with others joining in throughout the entire month to honor students who are pursuing four-year or two-year degrees, apprenticeship programs, workforce training or the military.

Videos and slides have been shared with participating schools, and those videos have been posted to the Iowa Department of Education's YouTube channel throughout the week for schools to share at their events.

## **GEAR UP lowa**

GEAR UP lowa successfully hosted its virtual annual conference titled, 'Develop the Possibilities.'

The day-long virtual conference on April 12 brought representatives from every GEAR UP lowa school together to plan for the upcoming year and strategize how to maximize GEAR UP lowa resources.

GEAR UP lowa's talented staff continues to be highly sought after to present at and lead sessions at national conferences. Earlier this month, GEAR UP lowa facilitators Graci Zeiger and Christine Nguyen presented 'Beyond the Cohort' at the Partners for Rural Impact Rural Summit in Lexington, Ky. The session detailed how GEAR UP lowa builds systemic statewide change that extends beyond GEAR UP lowa cohorts and communities. Zeiger and Nguyen helped attendees identify individual community needs and resources that can be shared with those communities and students to create a system of statewide support.

Outside of the classroom, GEAR UP lowa continued to facilitate students' participation in campus and career-site visits with many partner districts conducting visits through the GEAR UP lowa program. Students from Storm Lake, Marshalltown, South Tama, Des Moines, Clinton, Saydel and Davenport participated in visits to nearly 20 different campuses and career sites in the last month.

Finally, 63 GEAR UP lowa students at Clinton High School recently completed a six-week ACT prep course and took the ACT on April 23.

#### Local College Access Networks

Local College Access Network staff is ramping up for its FY25 grant cycle. Grant applications for FY25 are due next week and staff recently conducted an LCAN grant workshop for potential new LCANs.

Those grant applications will be reviewed in the upcoming weeks, and award notifications scheduled to go out in June.

## Course to College Coaching / AmeriCorps

We have been notified and hope to publicly announce soon that our Course to College Coaching program has received \$330,843 in competitive grant funding from AmeriCorps. The grant allows us to continue and expand the program, which has provided college access and success assistance to high school and college students in lowa since 2017. Course to College Coaching AmeriCorps members are hosted in high schools, community colleges, and virtually across lowa. Those members serve as college coaches, student leaders, and summer transition associates.

This program has been so successful that program planners Danielle Sampson and Liz Yaddof were recently asked to present on the program's inclusion of youth members at the America's Service Commission (ASC) National Service Training Event in Minneapolis.

Sampson and Yaddof presented on 'Expanding Youth Service Through Student Leadership, focusing on the program's expansion to include members under the age of 18, the positive effects of that change, and implementation challenges. Sampson and Yaddof led attendees through a brief strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats (SWOT) analysis to determine if expanding their AmeriCorps programs to include participants under the age of 18 would be beneficial and possible in their programs' communities.

## FAFSA Update

Shortly after receiving ISIR data from the U.S. Department of Education, Iowa College Aid was quickly able to begin distributing weekly FAFSA reports to every public high school in Iowa and many private schools as well.

The reports, which help school counselors and other college access professionals with FAFSA completion in their communities, were distributed to 364 schools in Iowa. The reports will continue to be issued weekly to provide professionals in the field with the most up-to-date data to assist them in identifying students and populations that may need additional support or interventions in completing the FAFSA. Our online dashboard at fafsa.iowa.gov was also quickly published to provide an additional tool to professionals in the field and our staff.

As of May 8, 42.7 percent of Iowa high school seniors had completed the FAFSA, a decrease of less than six percentage points from this time last year. Iowa's rate of year-over-year gap in FAFSA completion is half of the national average of 11 percentage points. Nearly 40 high schools have already exceeded their FAFSA completion rates from this time last year and almost 15 schools have achieved FAFSA completion rates of 70 percent or higher.

# IOWA COLLEGE AID COMMISSION MEETING

# **Meeting Minutes**

## March 22, 2024

## Call to Order

The Iowa College Student Aid Commission met March 22, 2024 at the Iowa Department of Education offices in the Grimes Building. Commission Chair Stork called the meeting to order at 9:10 a.m. with roll call. A quorum was not present. It was decided the meeting would continue without voting items.

## **Director's Updates**

Director Snow provided an update about a presentation that the Department of Education provided at a recent Iowa House Education Appropriations Subcommittee meeting alongside Bureau Chief Ford and Section Chief Brown. A number of core bodies of work were presented.

First, the Department's top four priorities in the administrative actions; Second, the Department's organizational chart; Third, the Governor's budget and recommendations; and Fourth, updates from the newly welcomed aligning entities

The Department's vision for building an excellent education system that empowers all students to achieve their full potential by ensuring that all students experience a world class education. A few key foundational themes have emerged in principles as a system that empowers families and teachers to best serve students together in partnership, it fosters innovation and supports personalized learning, it focuses resources and the classroom has greatest impact on student achievement and growth, it empowers students with multiple paths to postsecondary success and it supports vibrant, safe and healthy learning environments and provides transparency and accountability for learners, families, educators, communities and taxpayers.

All the Department's work, spanning early child learning through postsecondary pathways, is focused on advancing that vision and mission. Articulated in the Department's top four priorities are the support of a strong teacher pipeline, strengthen early literacy, narrow and close achievement gaps and empower students with multiple pathways to postsecondary success. A few administrative actions have included updating the postsecondary readiness indicator from being input focused to student outcome focused, incorporating the percentage of students who obtain college credit while in high school, the percentage of students who have a work-based learning experience and the percentage of students who obtain an industry recognized credential.

Directors Snow highlighted two recent grant programs that support this work:

The Credentials to Career Grant Program provides an opportunity for students to earn credentials with labor market value.

Childcare Careers Grant Program provides students the opportunity to earn a child care certificate to grow a workforce in their own communities.

A review of the Department's organizational chart post-alignment shows under the Chief Financial Officer an aligned accounting team that insures protocols and system and streamlines the duplication of efforts. The aligned IT team drives forward system efficiencies and securities while maintaining customization, shared platforms and grant management that the field interacts with. Iowa Services for the Blind and the Iowa School for the Deaf have moved from the Board of Regents to the Department. The Communications team now has the capability to outreach and communicate across lifelong learning for a border audience of our educational opportunities and coordinating approach to stakeholder communication. The HR team has prioritized DAS-consistent HR processes and the legal team has prioritized consistent rule making and contracts processes. The legislative aff team has provided a single point of contact for the general assembly while ensuring continued collaboration with content experts.

The Higher Education Division now includes the Iowa College Aid as well as the Board of Educational Examiners, whose core work is on licensed educator complaints, teacher licensure, professional development on ethical standards and approval of teacher preparation program curriculum. In the new Division of Innovation with the Bureau of STEM Opportunity, through alignment we've been able to leverage STEM hubs for our math and science standards review and public comments processes, support professional development and collaborate in partnership with state content experts. PK-12 and Iowa Public Broadcasting Services remain the same entities.

Director Snow reviewed the ICA's 15-state funded financial aid programs, 268 in-state and out-of-state postsecondary authorizations and postsecondary institutions to receive veteran directed and GI benefits. There are legislative conversations about ensuring that the National Guard Service Scholarships cover 100% of tuition minus federal tuition assistance or FTA funds. It can provide and promote access to non Title IV eligible courses of study.

Also discussed were the Bureau's 5 college access programs. The focus was on the \$25.8 million Gear Up Grant awarded to ICA to support the field over the next 7 years.

Additional budget items that are not specific to the ICA budget, the Governor's budget recommendation included an increase of \$244,000 for general administrative purposes that reflected an enterprise-wide increase in the Governor's budget. If appropriated, the Department would use these funds to offset increasing personnel costs, namely the salaries and benefits. And, it includes an additional Attorney 3 position that would support a near doubling of the size of the Department.

There is also a 2.5% increase or a \$5.7 million increase in the community college general aid known as SDA or general aid. And, a 2.5% or \$1.3 million to the ITG program for nonprofits and for profits about a \$3K increase.

Senator Quirmbach mentioned the National Guard Scholarship to consider mentioning living expenses to those who are on those appropriations.

## **Bureau Chief's Report**

David Ford provided the Bureau Chief's Report and discussed how he met with each of the ICA staff members along with Section Chiefs about how to be forward thinking with the bureau's post alignment.

Met with each staff member regarding needs, feedback, structure and going forward post alignment how we are best able to do that efficiently and effectively.

The Bureau has two sections – The first section is Financial Aid which Section Chief Todd Brown oversees and includes Postsecondary Registration and Scholarships and Grant programs. Section Chief Christina Sibaouih oversees Community Engagement.

There is a third group, Program Evaluation and Reporting, also overseen by Bureau Chief David Ford.

The Bureaus of Accounting, IT and Communications shares our processes across the board within the Department of Education.

## **Meeting Minutes Continued**

Emily Stork presented the minutes from the March 1, 2024 board meeting. Motion: Commissioner Shull moved to approve the meeting minutes as written. Motion: Commissioner Mulholland seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

#### **Administrative Rules**

Section Chief Todd Brown presented the recommended action

- Move to rescind Section 8 Iowa Opportunity Scholarship and adopt a new chapter 8 Iowa Opportunity Scholarship in lieu thereof;
- Move to rescind chapter 11 Iowa Tuition Grant Program for profit institutions and adopt new chapter 11 Iowa Tuition Grant for profit institutions in lieu thereof;
- Move to rescind chapter 13 Iowa Vocational Technical Grant and adopt new chapter 13 Iowa Vocational Technical Grant in lieu thereof;
- Move to rescind chapter 23 Skilled Workforce Shortage Tuition Grant and adopt new chapter 23 Skilled Workforce Shortage Tuition Grant in lieu thereof.

The Bureau is rescinding and re-promulgating these rules in line with executive order 10. The intent of executive order 10 is to eliminate outdated and obsolete rules, streamline rules, and reduce word counts.

These four packages are part of Phase 2 of in our work toad meeting executive order 10 in which we are rescinding and re-promulgating any administrative rules that contain referenced to the expected family contributions as that terminology will be obsolete during the 2024-2025 academic year.

Phase I implemented a consistent set of definitions as seen in these rule chapters where we are leveraging all those consistent definitions within all four of these rule chapters and the word counts across all these chapters have been reduced in some cases drastically, moving to a consistent format.

Regulatory analysis for these rules was published on January 10th, 2024 which contains a public comment period; in addition, a public hearing was held on January 31, 2024. There were no public comments received during either opportunity.

The rules were reviewed by the legislative committee meeting in the January and February meeting and approval was received from the Governor's office on March 1, 2024.

Emily Stork inquired about a motion to rescind.

Motion: Commissioner Shull moved to rescind. Motion: Commissioner Mulhollan seconded the motion, the rules were unanimously rescinded and adopted.

Emily Stork continues back to the Bureau Chief's report.

Bureau Chief David Ford presented two updates that include Financial Aid.

The Rural Iowa Veterinarian Loan Repayment program had over 41 eligible applicants of which 14 recipients received a \$60,000 loan repayment benefit they qualify for over a 4 year period after signing an agreement to fulfill those veterinary services in federally designated shortage areas.

The deadline for All Iowa Opportunity Scholarship was adjusted due to delays and disruptions in the release and availability of the FAFSA form and ICER data for this year. The Bureau is making an extensive effort to notify potential applicants. Preliminarily, response increases have been observed in student populations who have aged out of the foster system.

The IowaTuition Grant Accelerated provision is in place for Summer ITG eligibility and continuing to explore options for our program impacted by the unexpected family contribution and SAI transition.

Gear Up 3.0 is the 3rd version of the Gear Up federal grants that is ramping up right now offering family nights to make sure students and families fully understand what Gear UP can provide to them.

From our Local College Access Group, Bureau staff attended the Latino College Education Summit recently at DMACC in Ankeny.

Staff was also able to present at the Upper Midwest ACT conference in the tri-state area near Dubuque how that area of LCANs can bring the community together across a variety of sectors focused on access and postsecondary opportunities.

Course to College Coaching and AmeriCorp last week recognized students and coaches throughout a variety of social media platforms.

The Bureau continues to monitor the FAFSA process and was able to receive some test field and initial ICER records from the US Department of Education.

Commissioner Fitzgibbons, Bureau Chief Ford, Commissioner Putnam and Senator Quirmbach discussed the impact of the FAFSA delays on students and families.

Director Show shared information from the State Board of Education and stakeholders regarding joint enrollment with a focus on equitable enrollment and completion across student groups, the Board's interest in the Gear Up and Iowa College Aid and future presentations profiling the college access work.

#### Staff Reports

Lisa Pundt shared the Postsecondary Authorization report of schools that were approved, are under review or pending review. The 3rd and final US Dept of Education negotiated rulemaking ended March 7, 2024. There were 6 issues presented; the postsecondary authorization team was most interested in the program integrity and institutional quality committee session which affects state authorization and federal programs.

Section Chief Todd Brown shared research conducted about why the Iowa Work Study Program was defunded. Intel included history of the Iowa Work Study Program and details on the current state of student employment in colleges and universities. Senator Quirmbach shared the importance of the Work Study Program.

Bureau Chief David Ford discussed the change from using Board Effects to a Google doc process for Bureau of Iowa College Aid Board meetings and materials.

Section Chief Todd Brown shared that the US Department of Education last week sent out processed FAFSAs (aka ICERS) to both institutions and states. The Bureau has received about 20,000 lowa resident FAFSA results. Last year at this time 80,000 were received. S

Section Chief Chrisitna Sibaouih reported technical issues that impeded students from mixed-status families that are now able to complete the FAFSA online and the "Unsub Only" question affecting independent student submissions whose parents don't want their data reported now have additional information about how to answer the question. FAFSA will be conducting less verifications and corrections. As a result, many states have moved FAFSA deadlines, colleges have moved back priority FAFSA deadlines, some are considering pushing back commitment dates and offering other flexibilities. Comparisons show Iowa rates decreased from last year.

#### **Annual Report**

An overview of the Annual Report was provided by Bureau Chief DavidFord, Section Chief Christina Sibaouih and Section Chief Todd Brown.

Section Chief Todd Brown shared a financial aid report of the state appropriated funded Iowa College Aid programs. There were state appropriations of \$95 million across 7 scholarship and grant programs, 6 Ioan repayment or income bonus programs and \$29,000+ awards made in Fiscal Year 2023.

The report on Community Engagement was presented by Christina Sibaouih. It included

Courses to College efforts resulted in 250 participating high schools, 96 high schools with partner sites and 360 high schools that received FAFSA reports.

Course to College Coaching led to 27 student leaders in 16 schools, 8 Summer FAFSA associates, 3 College Success coaches and 18K+ member hours.

Local College Access Network (LCANS) funded 11 communities, awarded \$469,000 in grants, had 156 LCAN Action Team Members and 2400+ students, families and community members.

Course & Career Readiness held 59 enrolled courses, had 34 schools and agencies enrolled and 8 courses available.

Gear UP lowa Futur Ready assisted 19 high school partners and 11 school districts, hosted 9 college and career site visits and helped over 7,300 students receive services.

The Virtual College Coach enrolled 15,000 students, sent 289,000 text messages and received 20,000 text messages from Iowans.

Section Chief Todd Brown shared about the Postsecondary Authorization team efforts. The team authorized 268 schools, 185 of which were based in Iowa and 83 that were based out of state. There were 82 student complaints and 98 inquiries from out of state schools regarding authorization from Iowa.

Bureau Chief David Ford reported the Research team's findings that 50% of Iowa high school seniors filed the FAFSA, 62% of Iowa high school graduates enrolled in college the following Fall, 140,000 Iowans enrolled in postsecondary education and 70% of recent high school graduates that enrolled in college earned a credential.

The Communication team received over 205,000 visits to the Bureau's website, 3.4K followers on social media, gave away 98,000 free publications and had 26.8K digital newsletter subscriptions.

Senator Quirmbach and Bureau Chief Snow discussed if data was available yet regarding student retention from those who left college in 2021 that may have returned in 2023.

Bureau Chief Julie Ntem shared the financial report: Federal support remains the same. Total revenues are at 44.88% and total expenditures at 42.6%, interest is coming in at \$80,000 a month.

#### **Committee Reports**

Commissioner Fitzgibbon reports there is no Audit & Finance Committee Report as the last meeting was 3 weeks prior.

Commissioner Mulholland Legislative Committee Report is a reminder that the second funnel date was last Friday. The last day of the legislative session is just over 3 weeks away.
